### Hockey

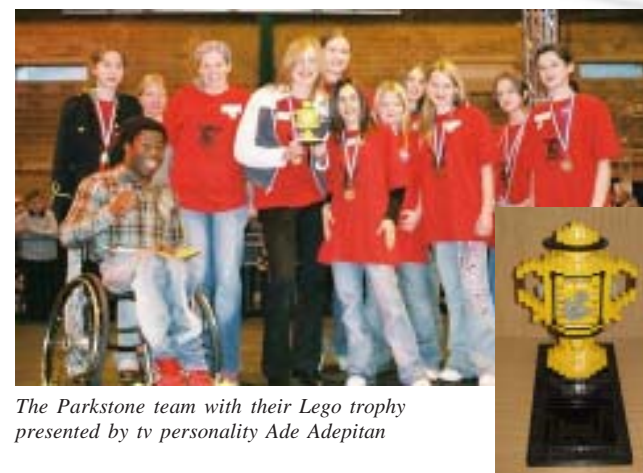

*All my friends know that I do a lot of sailing - and I mean a lot.*

*So it was no surprise for them to hear what I'd been doing all last summer. Yes you've guessed it I was sailing! However last year I qualified as part Great Britain's cadet world sailing team. The qualification was an eighteen race series over three weekends at three different locations around the country. In order to qualify you had to finish within the top seven out of a total of approximately eighty boats.*

*It was a highly competitive series which came down to the last race with about three points separating sixth, seventh, eighth and ninth place. My crew, Katie, and I won the final selection event earning us place in the team and a trip to the Atlantic coast of northern Spain.*

*The British team I went with was highly successful with all seven members finishing in the top twelve. The event was an incredible experience in which I met many international competitors such as the Australians (luckily, we were winning the Ashes at the time!). The opening and closing ceremonies were good fun as the social side of sailing is an added bonus!*

*This was an amazing achievement for Great Britain, which really inspired me to carry on sailing and face the challenges of a new boat in which I will sail for selection for this year's World's in April.*

## BREAKING DOWN THE LANGUAGE BARRIERS

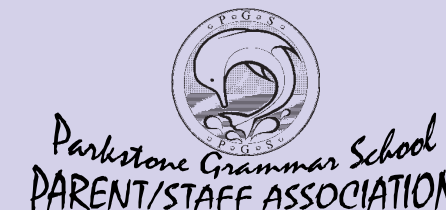

## Open University Success

Last year Parkstone excitedly launched the new Science Specialist school initiative of introducing Open University modules for students in Year 13.

Ten students started the courses and seven successfully passed.

This year twenty students have started the courses. The range of titles include:

- ◆ Studying Mammals
- ◆ Understanding Human Nutrition
- ◆ Human Genetics & Health Issues
- ◆ Life in the Oceans:
  - Exploring the Blue Planet
- ◆ Planets an Introduction
- ◆ Modelling the Climate
- ◆ Introduction to Astronomy

## STATISTICAL ENRICHMENT

As part of the school's expanding enrichment programme, GCSE Statistics has been introduced into the school's curriculum.

To support the new initiative Poole and Parkstone jointly held two lectures for their Year 8 and Year 10 students.

The Year 10 presentation was given by Fiona Howarth, a former employee of BMW, who has been involved in the development of electrically-powered cars and who is currently seconded to the Carbon Trust. She gave a fascinating insight into the world of automotive engineering by setting the pupils a mini-investigation and conducting a review of their final presentation.

The Year 8 event focused on code breaking, a field in which mathematicians have a distinguished history, particularly during the Second World War. The lecturer talked about the Enigma Project at Bletchley Park and identified cross-curricular links through a series of interactive activities.

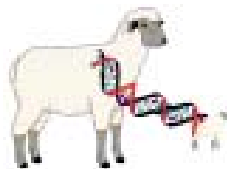
## A CHEMICAL ALTERNATIVE

The Chemistry Department at Parkstone has been accepted onto a pilot project being run by OCR to evaluate a proposed "Alternative to Coursework" examination specification and practical skills development scheme.



The pilot will be run with the present Year 12 and will contribute significantly to the forthcoming revision of A Level examination provision in 2008.

## Parkstone students take Science to a new level



The introduction of Science for Public Understanding (SPU) has been enthusiastically embraced at Parkstone.

Science for Public Understanding is not just about scientific facts, although the students do need an outline understanding of the techniques employed, for example in genetic engineering. The nature of scientific enquiry is discovered as is the ability to present arguments based on scientific evidence both for and against a range of controversial topics, as well as realising the impact of new scientific technologies such as Pre-Implantation Genetic Diagnosis from a personal and ethical point of view.

The syllabus requires students to complete two pieces of coursework- a 'Critical Account of Scientific Reading', essentially a book review but also delving more deeply into the science content of the book, and the 'Study of a Topical Scientific Issue', a longer piece of work chosen and researched by the students. Both of these aspects of the coursework produced outstanding pieces of work which have been a joy to read!

This year the course has also been offered to Year 10 students who are studying it over two years. The first term of teaching SPU to Year 10 has begun successfully, with students and staff alike enjoying the course content and activities. The students are very enthusiastic and forthcoming in discussion and staff are really enjoying teaching the course. The development of this course has been one of the most rewarding and beneficial developments to come out of our Specialist Status.

## A VISIT TO NUMBER 10 !

Parkstone's Chairman of Governors, Cary Wicks, was recently excited to learn that she had been invited to a Reception with the Prime Minister at 10 Downing Street. Here Cary tell us all about it :

*Just before Christmas, I was delighted (and very flattered) to receive an invitation through the post from The Prime Minister and Mrs Blair to a Reception at 10 Downing Street that was to be held in January. The Reception was being given to recognise the contribution made by voluntary school governors and 150 guests had been invited from names which were submitted nationally from Local Authorities across the UK.*

*I felt very proud to attend the Reception as a representative of the governors in Poole and was determined, if given the chance, to lobby the Prime Minister on some of the issues pertinent to Poole. It was a great feeling passing through the door of No 10 – and wonderful straight away to bump into Gordon Brown and his wife who were on their way to another Reception in the building. Having noticed the newspaper placards around London that afternoon that they were expecting another baby in the summer, I was pleased to congratulate them both on their news!*

*The Governors Reception was held in the State Rooms on the first floor and to get to them you had to make your way up the famous staircase that has black and white portraits hanging on the walls of all the Prime Ministers in chronological order with the most recent incumbents at the top – but not the portrait of the Prime Minister of the day! We were treated to drinks and scrumptious little eats and it was really interesting to meet governors from the length and breadth of the country and to talk about their experiences of being a governor, about educational matters of the moment and the challenges that each particular person was grappling with in their schools and Local Authorities.*

*The Prime Minister and his wife arrived just before 7pm and were in attendance for about 45 minutes. Tony Blair acknowledged in the short speech he gave to us mid way through the evening, that there were about 400,000 governors across the country and that although we represented a tiny proportion, the Reception was a chance for him and his wife to recognise the work we do in education. We were invited to explore all the rooms – there was so much to see - antique furniture, portraits of eminent British scientists, historical figures and landscapes, an exquisite display of silverware – modern as well as antique - and various pieces of sculpture.*

The show was a great success with magnificent performances by all involved. The production had a very strong chorus,

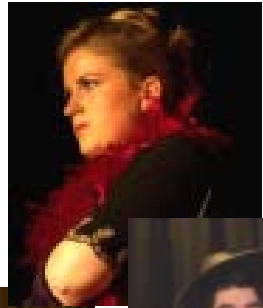

## SUZIE SAILS TO HER AWARD

Deputy Head Girl, Suzanne Goodwin, is working hard to achieve her Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award. One part of the accreditation involved Suzie joining the crew of a sail boat - quite a challenge for a non-sailer! Suzie tells us how the journey went :

"I challenge any one of you to try and make tea without spilling anything. Easy, you might claim, but what if I asked you to do it onboard a sailing boat in the middle of the English Channel at four o'clock in the morning? Recently I found myself watching a succession of mugs slide across a ship's draining board at a similar unearthly hour, and if I had been properly awake I would have asked myself, "What am I doing here?"

I undertook a five-day cruise to the Channel Islands in early June for the residential section of my Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Award. With no sailing experience I felt slightly daunted at the prospect of crewing for the 62ft rigged ketch Morning Star, but the atmosphere was welcoming, friendly, and I found myself among other participants who also had little or no sailing experience. Very soon we were all able to put sails up and down, take the helm (steer the boat!) and tie a range of useful knots. My most memorable experience is of being hoisted up the 60ft mast while moored in Cowes - purely to admire the view. I only worried when the two ropes holding me

were tied off and the crew decided to rock the boat!

The Morning Star Trust is a fantastic organisation, offering a range of comparatively affordable sail training opportunities. The Trust itself is Christian, although I didn't realise this and I believe that it made the voyage more valuable by bringing us all much closer together. I would recommend the experience to anybody and, while I know I could never be considered as an Ellen Macarthur, I would certainly love to take part in another cruise myself."
